

### >> DIY Ancestry Wall

It started with an idea. "Both my husband and I are Mexican American, and I really wanted to give our kids, 3 and 1, a narrative about how we got here," says Chavez, who lives in the San Francisco Bay Area and documents her home-improvement adventures at @house.of.esperanza on Instagram. Soon Chavez was scouring ancestry websites, old albums, and even church ledgers from Mexico to dig up photographs and documents. The effort was worth it. Chavez now uses the wall—which goes back six generations—as a testament to culture. "It's my way of passing down stories, so my children never forget our history."



### DOS + DON'TS

### **DO A TEST RUN**

"Before making any nail holes, cut the shapes of your frames out of craft paper and tape them to the wall to see what your layout will look like."



## DON'T RELY JUST ON NAILS

"Before you hang frames, put a little museum putty (a blended rubberbased adhesive) on the back of each so they stick to the wall and you don't have to always readjust."



### DO SCAN

"If you'd rather not display original documents or photos, use an app such as TurboScan to scan them."
